The Musée des Arts Décoratifs presents its 2023-2024 program, envisioned by Director, Christine Macel, who was appointed to this position eight months ago.

Selected by Johannes Huth, President of the Board of Directors of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs, and Sylvie Corréard, General Director of Les Arts Décoratifs, Christine Macel has remained consistent with her desire to offer an historical perspective of the museum's collections that emphasizes the uniquely high quality of works preserved to the widest audience possible, revitalizing the museum's *raison d'être* in both its heritage and education.



According to Sylvie Corréard, "The richness of the collections, the constant presence of students and pupils, and the strong links that have been forged with industry and craftspeople since its creation, make the Musée des Arts Décoratifs a unique place in the museum landscape. Christine Macel offers a resolutely contemporary program, capable of making today's world visible and understandable through objects from all periods, selected from among the most remarkable in all fields of creation, especially fashion, design, art, decorative arts, and graphic design."

Christine Macel opens a new chapter in the history of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs with a profoundly interdisciplinary vision, with proposals that place the museum's collections at the center, combining unprecedented installations and innovative temporary exhibitions that encompass all areas of the decorative arts.

### Two Museums and a Library: A Unique Collection in the World

"Designed as a source of inspiration for artists and craftsmen, the Musée des Arts Décoratifs tells the story of art that has a function, from the everyday to the exceptional, in connection with fine and industrial arts." The museum began assembling its collection in the early 19th century, bringing together works of national reference, objets d'art, jewelry, toys, design, advertising, and graphic design. The museum houses the National Collection of Fashion and Textiles, one of the largest fashion collections in the world, along with the oldest French collection of non-Western arts in the country, with vast holdings from Asia and the Middle East. With more than one million artworks in the collection. the Musée des Arts Décoratifs also holds important objects from the Art Deco and Art Nouveau periods, as well as thousands of drawings and photographs, and the largest collection of wallpapers in the world. With works dating back to the Middle Ages, the permanent exhibition of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs displays over 6,000 artworks on seven floors, alongside twenty period rooms and reconstructed interiors.

The Musée des Arts Décoratifs also oversees the Musée Nissim de Camondo, which houses one of the most important collections of 18<sup>th</sup> century decorative arts in France. Constructed by Count Moïse de Camondo (1860-1935) as a replica of the Petit Trianon at Versailles, Camondo filled the mansion with impeccable 18<sup>th</sup> century furnishings. Upon the death of his son, Nissim de Camondo, who died in the French Airforce during the Second World War, Count Moïse de Camondo bequeathed the mansion and its contents to the Musée des Arts Décoratifs.

The Library of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs was founded in 1864, bringing together a collection of over 200,000 books, catalogues, illustrated scrolls, periodicals, and blueprints, from both public and private collections, offering a range of information about the decorative arts, fashion, architecture, design, graphic arts, and the art of gardening, to the public. The Library includes the important Maciet Collection, a 5,000 strong archive of pictures, engravings, photographs and lithographs, all documented by Jules Maciet, a prolific collector of his time.

### Temporary Exhibitions, 2023-2024

September 2023 begins with the exhibitions *Fashion and Sport* and *Iris van Herpen.* Following this fashion-focused program, Christine Macel presents two major exhibitions highlighting the worlds of decorative arts, advertising, and design in 2024.

### → La Naissance des Grands Magasins. Mode, Design, Jouet, Publicité. 1852-1925 (The Birth of Department Stores. Fashion, Design, Toys, Advertising. 1852-1925)

Transdisciplinary exhibition that combines posters, fashion, decorative arts, design and toys, tells the story of a new way of consuming and the emergence of the Parisian woman as a figure of the times.

Set within the Central Hall of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs, the exhibition, *L'intime, de la chambre aux réseaux sociaux* will study the subject of intimacy over the centuries. With a focus on how intimacy has changed the world of decorative arts, from the design of bedrooms, beds, armchairs and sofas, to dressing screens, vanities, bathtubs, and connected devices, the exhibition will explore a diverse range of objects all transformed by society's relationship with, and acceptance of, the idea of intimacy. Broaching topics often considered taboo, *L'intime, de la chambre aux réseaux sociaux* invites visitors to engage with the artistic contributions of skilled craftsmen, artists, and designers from the 18<sup>th</sup> to the 21<sup>st</sup> centuries, including Gustave Caillebotte, Pierre Bonnard, Adolf Loos, the Bouroullec brothers, Eileen Gray, Gaetano Pesce, Superstudio, and Archizoom.

# La naissance des grands magasins. Mode, design, jouet, publicité. 1852-1925\*

April 10 → October 13, 2024 Musée des Arts Décoratifs

Curator: Amélie Gastaut, Chief curator, Advertising and Graphic Design Collections

From the Spring through the Autumn of 2024, The Musée des Arts Décoratifs and the Cité de l'Architecture et du Patrimoine, will collaborate on a two-part history of the creation of department stores in Paris, beginning in 1852 and lasting until the present day.

The first exhibition, to be held at the Musée des Arts Décoratifs from April 10<sup>th</sup> through October 13<sup>th</sup>, 2024, examines the rise of department stores within the historical, political, and social context of the Second Empire, exploring the development, golden age, and consecration of these mammoth *Magasins* at the 1925 International Exhibition of Decorative and Industrial Arts. Beginning with the establishment of Le Bon Marché, Les Magasins du Louvre, Le Printemps, La Samaritaine and Les Galeries Lafayette, the exhibition will convey the importance of this new style of commerce and explain how it gave rise to a female-driven world of consumerism.

The second exhibition, presented at the Cité de l'Architecture et du Patrimoine, from October 16<sup>th</sup>, 2024, through March 16<sup>th</sup>, 2025, focuses on the European history of department stores throughout the decades, from the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century to the present day. This segment depicts the significance of architectural design in the consumer experience while highlighting the prominent exterior facades, grandiose interiors, and staging of merchandise in department stores across France and Europe.

# The Museum in Motion

### Du bol ! À travers les collections asiatiques du musée des Arts décoratifs\*

Presenting an installation of more than 250 objects, including 150 Chinese, Japanese, and Korean bowls, *Du Bol!* traces these works through the museum's permanent collections, from the Medieval Rooms to those dedicated to international design.

As an archetypal form of tableware in Asia, the bowl serves multiple purposes and is associated with specific practices. Used for tea, the consumption of food and drink, the presentation of objects, and for aesthetic purposes, bowls small and large, ancient and contemporary, will be displayed throughout the museum. This will include a variety of materials, including stoneware, porcelain, agate, metal, lacquered wood, cloisonne, and painted enamel, as well as prints and photographs from the archives of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs that illustrate the use of bowls in Asian culture. Additionally, a traditional *tokonoma*, or teahouse niche, by Yamacho House of Kyoto, will be displayed.

### Une salle permanente dédiée aux Lalanne : Hippopotame, rhinocéros, moutons et autres hybridations\*

August 2023

Musée des Arts Décoratifs

In 2021, the Musée des Arts Décoratifs received an important donation of sixteen artworks and 38 drawings by Claude (1925-2019) and François-Xavier (1927-2008) Lalanne. This substantial donation adds to the museum's representative collection of works by the Lalannes, which includes the iconic *Rhinocrétaire* (1966) by François-Xavier, donated to the museum in 2013 thanks to GRoW @ Annenberg, with the support of Regina and Gregory Annenberg Weingarten.

The Musée des Arts Décoratifs, which played a key role in promoting the Lalanne's work with an exhibition in 2010, has decided to dedicate a room in its permanent collection to this artistic couple, who, since the 1960s, have championed a surrealist approach to furniture. François-Xavier's menagerie will enter into a dialogue with Claude's hybrid creations. The blue resin hippopotamus bathtub, and François-Xavier's *Mouche* ceramic and rosewood toilets, will coexist with Claude's *Choupatte* and *L'Homme* à la tête de chou. This exhibition is an opportunity to discover the tone of their unconventional work, guided by humor and the innovative use of materials.

In France, since the end of the Second World War, there has been an ongoing debate between urban policies and how they influence life and living standards. Beginning in 1983, this juxtaposition was photographed by Carros-le-Neuf in the Alpes-Maritimes region, Sabine Weiss, Jean Dieuzaide, Bernard Gille, Guy le Querrec, Emil Schulthess, and Jacques Windenberger, at the behest of exhibition curator and communications director, Marc Netter. The photographic evidence captured significant moments in human existence, from childhood to old age, the street sweeper to the real estate agent, the priest to the family, and everything in between; Socio-photography depicting life in France. This collection of over 500 photographs, contact sheets, and documents, entered the collections of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs in 2023, and provides a perspective of public and private spaces for all.

### Le Japon en couleurs. Photographies du xix<sup>e</sup> siècle\*

November 8 → December 31, 2023 Library of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs

The Musée des Arts Décoratifs preserves a collection of nearly 700 handcolored photographs of the Yokohama Shashin style, produced in Japan from the early 1860s to the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. These images depict landscapes, monuments, every day and theatrical scenes, and portraits, conveying a stereotypical vision of the Land of the Rising Sun. Each photograph is individually hand-colored, allowing for a subtle and strategically diverse range of color palettes and motifs.

Masters of the genre include Felice Beato and Raimund von Stillfried, who worked alongside Kusakabe Kimbei, the dominant photographer of the time, who operated from his studio in Yokohama. Kimbei produced not only prints and objects decorated with photographs, but also silk and lacquer albums, catering to the desires and budgets Western collectors.

These photographs, donated by Raymond Koechlin in 1903, Hugues Krafft in 1914, and Gustave Schlumberger in 1929, serve as both collectibles and sources of inspiration and knowledge. Many of them will be exhibited for the first time, accompanied by a publication by Volonté d'art editions.

In January 2024, the Musée des Arts Décoratifs will unveil a new portion of its permanent collections from the fields of fashion and jewelry, displaying approximately thirty couture and ready-to-wear looks, along with fifty accessories and works of jewelry, that dialogue with masterpieces of 20<sup>th</sup> century design and modern-day artworks. Thanks to donations made by Les Lalannes and works acquired by Cercle Design, the presentation pays special tribute to couturiers and designers who have enriched the collections of the Musée des Arts Décoratifs.

These displays will showcase works by **Balmain, Andrea Crews, Comme des Garçons, Schiaparelli, Issey Miyake, Xuly Bët, Elizabeth de Senneville, Valentino, Paco Rabanne, Christian Dior, Hermès, Lanvin, Line Vautrin, Gilles Jonemann, Helmut Lang, Christian Astuguevieille**, and many others.

# Henry Cros (1840-1907). Sculpteur et dessinateur\*

the brother of poet, Charles Cros (1842-1888). Recognized by Rodin and Bourdelle, both of whom considered him a significant figure in the history of Modernism, Henry Cros became the first sculptor to explore the medium of glass by inventing a technique he called *pâte de verre*. A prolific draftsman, most of his work's remained in the hands of A.A. Hébrard foundry gallery, although significant donations were made to the Musée des Arts Décoratifs in 1914 and 1993. The monographic exhibition of his works, presented on the occasion of the 2024 Salon du Dessin, will showcase Cors's rich contributions to the field.
